# **MINISTER'S LETTER**

Dear Friends,

How quickly has this year happened? I don't know about you, but for me it feels like I only just packed away the decorations – and yes, they were down and in the loft before Epiphany!

Of course, the response many would offer here is that it is because the Christmas decorations and gifts have been available in the shops for weeks already, and this is true, there were Christmas gifts (and tubs of chocolates) on the shelves before even the fireworks for Guy Fawkes Night were available.

A usual response is that this is getting earlier and earlier each year, and whilst this is true, I am not sure if this is actually all that bad. Whilst the commercial element is not really the Christian message of Christmas, the presence of the word "Christmas" is more and more available to people who won't hear or see this word in an ever-growing secular world. And we might be tempted to distance ourselves from it all, and quietly mention in our churches what we really think Christmas should be about – but what does that achieve?

As I have travelled around the world, it is clear that all faith celebrations receive the same attention in their spiritual context, whether it was Eid in Malaysia, Diwali in India, or even Christmas in Japan! Each of these festivals is offered

culturally, but at their heart is a faith celebration that encourages all to think about what is being celebrated and why.

Perhaps as Christians we can recognise that the dialogue has already started — Christmas is everywhere — and the temptation to shut down the conversation by reminding people that they are getting it wrong is sometimes far too easy to be drawn into. Another way to look at it is that actually, people are having a HUGE celebration that is rooted in a festival that is really important to us, the birth of our saviour, Jesus, who came as a light in the darkness, and a gentle reminder that we celebrate it because of what this means to us might encourage them to see this the same way?

# LYMINGTON UNITED REFORMED CHURCH Guidelines Governing Forecourt Parking

NB: these guidelines have been set down in recognition of the Church's Health and Safety obligations, its Fire policy and to ensure a clear access for emergency services.

# 1. Parking Spaces

The Church Forecourt has five designated car parking spaces, three on the east side adjacent to the wall of Elliot's, and two on the west side parallel to the Old Manse fence, as marked (See Over)

Two of the five are permanently allocated, one for the Minister and the other for a Disabled Driver i.e. a Blue-badge holder that is to be displayed at all times.

An additional Parking space is also allocated for one Mobility vehicle adjacent to the front north wall of the church adjacent to the east side car parking spaces.

Due to the limited number of spaces, parking is restricted to Church Members, associates, volunteers and premises hirers actively engaged on Church duties or hire events.

The minister allocated parking space shall remain vacant at all times unless prior approval has been obtained from the Centre Manager or the Church Secretary.

# 2. Weekdays (Monday to Friday)

Lymington URC Parking Permits for specific day(s) will be issued by the Centre Manager to Church group leaders for a set number of people whilst engaged in the Open Door Cafe or gardening duties plus hire groups.

Cars should not be left for personal shopping purposes.

### 3. Saturday Parking

During the Months of October to April parking is available specifically for the Saturday Coffee morning team and others on church duties. Restrictions on the Minister's parking space and the Disabled Drivers space should be observed (as para 1 above).

**Saturday Forecourt Car Boot Sales** (8.00am and 2.00pm); from the first Saturday in May until the last Saturday in September, forecourt parking is not available during that period.

# 4. Sunday Service Parking

The five parking spaces are allocated on Sundays for the Minster/Preacher and the Organist, the remaining 3 space are reserved for Blue Badge disabled drivers only. Those on other Church duties are expected to park on the road or in the local carparks

Drivers dropping off a non-driving disabled person (who may have a blue badge) are asked to park on the road or in the local carparks. (Currently Sunday parking on the High Street is free of charge).

### 5. General Conditions

On days of Weddings, Funerals or special church events, parking is by prior arrangement via the Church Secretary.

The general public are not permitted to park in the forecourt at any time unless on specific church enquiry matters or business.

Car must not be parked in front of the Church main entrance glass doors at any time.

The practice of Chevron Parking is not permitted at any time.

Single seated mobility vehicles and bicycles may be parked at the rear of the church hall clear of the fire escape. Vehicles of any description must not be parked or left in the church east side walkaway at any time.


All users of the forecourt carpark shall avoid damage to the grass areas, kerb stones, the gates and other cars when manoeuvring their vehicles on entering or leaving the carpark.

Cars parked on the church premises are left entirely at the owner's risk.

The church will not be held responsible for any loss or damage to vehicles or loss, or damage caused by a driver to another vehicle whatsoever.

The last car driver to leave the forecourt carpark on any day shall close the church gates.
